Three of our Wyoming librarians recently had the opportunity to meet with Senator John Barrasso and Senator Cynthia Lummis in Washington, D.C. During the week of March 5-7, the group took part in "Voices for Libraries," an event held annually by Chief Officers of State Library Agencies (COSLA) including training and updates on federal funding for libraries, networking opportunities with librarians from all 50 states, and a visit to Capitol Hill to meet with Wyoming Senators to discuss the importance of Wyoming libraries.

"Voices for Libraries was a wonderful opportunity for Cass, Cristine, and I to share the impressive work our Wyoming libraries are performing in their communities with our senators," Abby Beaver said. "I had such a great time meeting with other state librarians and learning about their diverse institutions." The Wyoming librarians also visited the Library

The Converse County Libraries hosted their annual Ukrainian Easter egg decorating events at their Douglas and Glenrock locations on the evenings of March 5 and 6. Lisa McDonald, a third-generation Ukrainian, guided participants through this crafting workshop, and has been teaching pysanky classes for the Converse County Library System since moving to the area in 2017.

Aside from creating beautiful pysanky eggs, the event had another unexpected benefit connection. During one of the classes, a patron came in to observe, and later revealed that he was from Ukraine. He was able to have a conversation with Lisa McDonald, the instructor, who speaks Ukrainian fluently, and was able to make connections with other people from Ukraine in the area as a result.

"I was so happy that just by offering this class, we were able to help someone connect with others of his heritage, and maybe not to feel so much like a stranger in a strange land!" said Tamara Lehner, Adult Program Manager for the Converse County Library System.

Grant and Award Opportunities

Walmart Spark Good Local Grants

Deadline: April 15, 2024

Walmart believes that strengthening local communities creates value for business as well as society. 2024 EBSCO Solar Grants

Deadline: April 17, 2024

For the ninth consecutive year, EBSCO

Information Services (EBSCO) is accepting applications for grants that will fund solar installations at libraries around the world. \$300,000 in grants are available to help awarded libraries offset their library expenses by incorporating solar power. All academic, school, and public libraries that are current EBSCO customers are eligible to apply. EBSCO will pay for the initial installation through the grant. The library, town, or college will own the system and be responsible for all post-installation/ongoing maintenance of the solar array. There are several criteria that will be used to assess the viability of each submission, for instance, a site with a large roof surface and a newer roof with a lifespan consistent with a new solar system or space for a ground installation.

Sara Jaffarian School Library Program **Award**

Deadline: May 1, 2024

The Sara Jaffarian School Library Program Award is an annual award to a school library that has conducted an exemplary program or program series in the humanities during the current school year. It consists of (1) a \$5,000 cash award; (2) a crystal award; and (3) the promotion of the winner as a model program for other school libraries.

Art Resources Transfer's Library Program

Deadline: Ongoing

This program provides free books on contemporary art to public institutions nationwide. Public libraries, public schools, prisons, and reading centers that self-define as under-served are eligible to order free books through this Library Program. Institutions can order anytime throughout the year. Books are entirely free and shipped free of charge.

The Pilcrow Foundations Children's **Book Project Program Grant**

Deadline: Rolling

The Pilcrow Foundation, a national non-profit public charity, provides a 2-to-1 match to rural public libraries that receive a grant through its Children's Book Project and contribute \$200-\$400 through a local sponsors for the purchase of up to \$1,200 worth (at retail value) of new, hardcover children's books. We provide a list of over 500 quality hardcover children's books from which Children's Book Project grant recipients can select books best suited for their community, including award-winning and starreviewed titles.

Wyoming Arts Council Arts Access Project Grant

DEADLINE: Rolling

The Fiscal Year 2024 Arts Access Project Grant application is open for projects taking place until June 30, 2024, and provides arts project funding for organizations that meet any of the following four criteria: projects increasing arts access for, or primarily serving, people with disabilities; arts projects led by and/or primarily serving BIPOC communities (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color); projects involving folk & traditional arts and artists; and organizations in communities with populations of less than 3,000. An organization may receive up to \$1,000 with no match requirement.

Black Hills Corporation Community Giving

DEADLINE: Ongoing

Areas of focus are arts and culture, civic and community development, education, environment, human services, and youth development. Giving limited to Black Hills Energy service areas.

BNSF Railway Foundation Grants

DEADLINE: Ongoing

Supports organizations and programs that support and improve the general welfare and quality of life in the communities in which BNSF Railway Company operates. Generally, they will consider requests for funding that clearly fall within one or more of the following categories: civic services, cultural organizations, educational institutions, health and human service organizations, youth organizations, and a federally recognized tribal government.

Through Wyoming Crossroads Grants, nonprofit organizations will be encouraged to explore the idea of growth through change and create programming and project opportunities that dig deep into themes related to Wyoming's identity, our sense of community, our connection to the land, unwavering persistence, and of course our ability to manage change. The next deadline is Monday, April 15, for Digital Media or **Preservation Projects.**
